



Reject move to gain control Halton, Peel Trust, Savings

A bid to gain control of Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Company was thwarted Tuesday afternoon, when directors of Halton and Peel held a special meeting in Oakville and unanimously turned down an offer from Security Capital Corporation.

Security, a Toronto company, announced Saturday it was offering to purchase a majority of shares in the Oakville-based trust firm. "It's a stinking idea, the whole proposition," Halton and Peel general manager O.E. Manning said. "They are sneaking in the back door; they got a list of shareholders and started to telephone them."

Halton and Peel's assets exceed \$75,000,000. Besides the head office in Oakville, offices are located in Brampton, Burlington, Simcoe, Delhi, Georgetown, Cooksville and Milton. The North Halton advisory board of Halton and Peel includes John Goy of Acton, Dr. B.D. Young of Brookville, John T. Armstrong of Georgetown (chairman), and Mike Ledwith, Reford Gardhouse and Maurice Besty of Milton. Dr. C.A. Martin of Milton is the local director.

Mr. Manning reported a letter was being sent to all shareholders on Tuesday evening, advising them of the Board of Directors stand. "About 90% of them have already been contacted by telephone, and not one of them is going along with Security's offer," he said.

School bell, electric motor stolen in North Halton area

During the week of August 27 to September 2 personnel of Milton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police worked a total of 782 1/4 hours and patrolled 7,098 miles patrol 34 charges were preferred, 49 traffic warnings issued and 77 vehicles were safety checked. There were 101 convictions registered in Magistrate's Court.

There were five property damage accidents investigated as well as three personal injury accidents, resulting in five persons being injured. Total property damage as a result of these accidents was approximately \$3860. Causes of accidents were - losing control of vehicle, follow too close, inattentive driving and a blow out. There were four charges laid under the Highway

Traffic Act as a result of these accidents.

There were 27 general occurrences during this period, including the theft of a school bell valued at approximately \$100, and an electric motor valued at \$105, four liquor investigations resulting in six charges being laid under the Liquor Control Act, one stolen bicycle was recovered for Georgetown P. D. All other occurrences were of a minor nature, Cpl. K. Kingman reports.

Halton Medical Officer of Health has distinguished Air Force career

Dr. H. B. Hay, 51, who retired from an illustrious career in the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1965 has replaced Dr. A. F. Bull as Medical Officer of Health for Halton County. Dr. Bull resigned

earlier this year to accept a position with the Federal Department of Health.

Born in Edmundston, New Brunswick, Dr. Hay attended McGill University and left school in 1939 to begin what developed into a remarkable career with the RCAF. He earned a Distinguished Service Order, Distinguished Flying Cross and Bar and Canadian Decoration while in the air force. Following the war, he requested and was granted a leave of absence from the RCAF to return to school.

On completion of his schooling Dr. Hay returned to the force. While in the air force he was stationed in many places including Toronto, London, England, Lachine and Trenton.

In 1965 Dr. Hay retired from the RCAF as Commanding Officer at the Institute of Aviation Medicine. Among his long impressive list of degrees Dr. Hay is a Certified Specialist in Aviation Medicine, he holds his Master's Degree, his Bachelor of Science and Master of Public Health. He retired from the Air Force ranked as Group Captain in 1965.

Later in 1965 he served as a Medical Administrative Consultant to the Department of Health in New Brunswick. He was stationed in Fredericton.

In September of 1966 he moved to Moncton to take a job as District Medical Health Officer for the Department of Public Health. This included coverage for 190,000 people. He began his new duties in the

Quiet week again for Acton O.P.P.

One break, enter and theft and six minor complaints produced a relatively quiet week for members of the Acton O.P.P., during the period August 27 to September 2.

761 miles patrolled during 224 working hours resulted in six traffic charges and 17 warnings being issued.

One hit and run accident, still under investigation and one other minor collision accounted for approximately \$250 property damage.

In Magistrate's Court, at Milton, on August 28, one liquor and 14 traffic convictions were registered. Defendants paid a total of \$427 in fines and \$55 Court Costs.

We infer along until we're wrong.
