July - A big pig laid down on the side of Main Street and kicked the bucket.

July - Twelve births, four marriages and six deaths were registered in this municipality during the six months ending 30th June.

August - Mill Street is very much improved by the abundant coat of gravel it received.

August - A young man with a long swallow-tail coat and high plug hat created considerable excitement on Mill and Main streets Tuesday evening.

September - Hats in all the latest styles from 75 cents up.

September - A large number of new hats have been worn since the elections—the outcome of bets on the results.

June 20, 1878 - A man considerably "glowed" drove into the Village on Tuesday evening. He took his rig into one of the back streets, unhitched his horse, tied it to the fence and left it there. He then went to one of the hotels, "stew" some whiskey and after an absence of an hour managed to return to his horse and buggy.

He tried to hitch up his horse, putting its head towards the dashboard. At last he got it hitched, to his own satisfaction, and told the animal to go along. The horse first went forwards, then backwards, then sideways and at last got so confused and entangled that it fell down. The man went to sleep being completely overpowered by bad pop, or something else. In this queer mess a kind Samaritan found the rig and set things right. The horse, no doubt glad to face as he had always been used to, started off, and went home.
