For the time being, headquarters of the Plastics Products Division will be located in the company's office facilities in Rexdale, Ont.

## George Kerr kicks off campaign gives policy at press conference

Provincial member of parliament for Halton County, George Kerr of Burlington wasted little time getting his political machinery into motion following the announcement of the October 17 election.

Mr. Kerr, P.C. candidate for the new Halton West riding held a press conference at his election headquarters in Burlington Monday. The official kickoff for the Conservative campaign will take place tomorrow night (Thursday) in Hamilton with Mr. Kerr, Halton East P.C. candidate Jim Snow and Premier John Robarts all in attendance.

Distribution of education costs and regional government are two of the biggest issues for Halton West in the coming election, Mr. Kerr said.

The P.C. candidate expressed his approval of the Smith report and its recommendations urging

a two tier educational system and regional government. "Home owners are only kidding themselves if they think there can be a tax reduction without regional government," Mr. Kerr feels regional government must come if there is to be any tax reduction on real estate.

It is hoped Regional government will be in effect by 1970, he said. This is the reason for the O.M.B. holding up Milton's application for annexing land in north Oakville. If regional government came into effect it would alleviate the situation in Milton and allow the town more breathing space on the south border.

He criticized his opposition for promising to take 80 per cent of education costs under provincial legislation. This, he said, would prove immediate relief but in the long run would be no further ahead.

Legal aid, air pollution, consumer protection, child welfare, job welfare and minimum wage are among the issues recent legislation has been enacted upon by the Conservative Government.

When questioned about what legislation had been enacted concerning investor protection, the candidate answered a thorough revision. It now provides more information about trust monies, activities for the company, and assets of the corporate structure.

Mr. Kerr is planning a cook-out rally in early October and will have booths at the Acton, Milton and Georgetown fairs.
