Back to school night attracts many parents

Almost 90 took advantage of a back to school night for parents of grade nine students at Acton district high school last Wednesday evening.

Parents had the opportunity of acquainting themselves with their children's teachers and a rundown of the course of study from each one. They were divided into five groups according to the class their child is assigned to and visited each room on a rotary basis.

Teachers gave the adult "students" an opportunity to ask questions before each period ended.

Parents were welcomed by school board chairman Tom Watson at an assembly in the gymnasium prior to "classes" and he outlined improvements in the school in the last few years. He felt the board was now able to attract and hold top-rated teachers. In the past year graduates had shown slightly better than the average marks in the province.

Principal E. A. Hansen told parents education is not just the concern of teachers but a dual role for home and school. He emphasized the desirability of contacting the school if any difficulties arise and assured parents teachers would provide time to discuss problems.

Enrolment this year is 455 and grade nine is divided into five

classes, three of them in the five year stream and two in the four year. Mr. Hansen said although the school is small this sometimes worked to an advantage for students.

Vice Principal J. Bray explained the school system of assessing each student's capabilities, and the hours of homework required. He said grade nine students should have a minimum of one hour's homework each night to a maximum of two hours. If students followed this routine they would have good study habits when they reached higher grades.

After parents attended the various classes refreshments were served in the gymnasium.

Start discussions over health merger

While Halton is settled with its health unit nursing staff, there may be more changes in store for the county's health unit. A merger with Peel County Health Unit is being considered.

An initial fact-finding meeting of the two county's health representatives was held in Brampton last week, and ended with an agreement to meet again in October, after the Provincial Department of Health gives some further direction on changing grants.

The Province has offered increased grants in 1966-75 per cent instead of the present 50 per cent—in return for certain programs to be instituted at the local level. Standardization of health programs and an enlargement or merger of existing services has been suggested as one answer.

"We have not come to any conclusions whatsoever, as some papers may have indicated," Reeve Austan Ledwith, chairman of Halton's Board of Health told County Council on Friday.
