### Esquesing Council briefs

During the Esquesing Township Council's meeting on Mon-

Members signed a contract with Blue Chip Restoration Co. of Milton to make \$3,970 worth of repairs to the township building. The building is leaking and some of the face bricks are to be replaced.

Council also authorized the Tomlinson and Associates consulting firm to make a \$9,100 report on traffic and road needs in the township. Members are considering having a local group or several groups make a manual traffic count in connection with the survey, which would cost about half the price of a mechanical count by the consultants.

The C.N.R. was asked to install flashing lights as warning signal at the Five Sideroad crossing.

Accounts paid included \$7 for one fox shot by a township resident Sept. 15.

The roads department was ured to apply calcium to several township roads where ratepayers have complained of dust, to a limit of \$1,500.

Building inspector Tom Mc-Lean was asked to meet with P. Straw, R. R. 2, Georgetown, who wants a permit to wreck one building and use a second building in Norval for a storage warehouse. ·

## Halton's Kerr, Snow help Robarts launch campaign

his campaign platform in full.

Excitement and enthusiasmechoed from one double-decker bus to the other Friday as George Kerr and Jim Snow supporters. sourred on by segments of the Oakville Citizens Band and the Burlington Tour Band, travelled to Hamilton to help Ontario Premier John P. Robarts officially

kick off his election campaign. The Halton East and Halton West candidates and their supporters attended the rally in Scott Park School in Hamilton, travelling from their home riding headquarters in Oakville and Burlington with a busload of sup porters apiece. They joined P.C. candidates from the six Hamilton ridings in supporting the prem-

ier's kick-off.

Despite having to travel and the fact many were tied up at home enumerating and preparing the campaign, the Halton supporters made up a large portion of the estimated 700 in attendance. A mere mention of either of the Halton candidates brought with it a chorus of "When the saints come marching in," or "When Georgie comes marching home. When the premier was introduced the chorus changed from "Georgie" to "Johnny" and people cheered, banners were raised,

speeches. Mr. Kerr warned voters to beware of opposition promises -"I've heard them time and time again. They'll take over this, they'll take over that. They're going to pay 100 per cent of this and 80 per cent of that. It's not that simple. Running a government is no easy chore."

Mr. Snow express gratification to be a P.C. candidate and said he was confident no stone would be left unturned in the conservative campaign.

Your familiar telephone is a wonderful friend to have handy especially in times of emergency. However, it can only respond to your dialed commands. Dialing a wrong number can waste precious time when calling for such emergency help as the Police or Fire Departments. Bell Canada provides space at the beginning of our telephone directories for emergency numbers so that you will have the numbers close at hand when they are needed. Why don't you check now to make sure that these important numbers have been filled in. In Acton your Police number is 853-1250; and your Fire Department number is 853-1212.

It is most important to know which Fire Department serves your particular area and to know that number. If you ever need to call either the Police of Fire Departments in an emergency, here are just a few reminders which will speed help on its way. Dial, or tell the Operator the number you need, carefully, of course. Stay on the line and talk slowly and clearly, giving your name and address and the reason for calling. Try to remain calm and to answer all questions promptly, giving a brief but complete description of the emergency. Wait for instructions from the Policeman or Fireman. I hope that you never have to use the telephone for such an emergency call, but if you do, it can be a trusted and speedy servant.

If there is a bride-to-be in your family this month and September is becoming almost as popular a month as June for weddings - you're probably discovering what a big help your telephone can be. Calling the florist, photographer, beauty shop, checking on the wedding gown and bridesmaids dresses and invitations can all be done easily by telephone. These rates also apply on calls to Bell Canada exchanges in Labrador and the Northwest Territories, but do not apply on calls to other communities outside our Quebec and Ontario territory.
