Endurance contest for roller skaters starts Friday night

First roller skating marathon ever held in Acton will start Friday night at the community centre, sharp at 8 p.m., under the auspices of the recreation committee.

Entries will be taken right up to 7.45 p.m. Friday and arena manager Harold Townsley says contestants must be there by that time.

Object of the marathon is to see who can skate the longest. The first three hours skaters will roll along without a break. From that point on they'll have a five minute break each hour.

Into that five minutes skaters must cram in their lunches and any other duties they wish to perform, not forgetting the call of nature. Judges will be there all the time checking to see the rules are closely followed.

Prize money for the endurance contest comes from skaters' entry fee. Rental of skates from the arena canteen will cost two bits an hour but the maximum charge will not exceed two dollars.

Since this is the first venture of this type in Acton manager Townsley is anxious to see how it will go over.

Rules and regulations will be explained to skaters before they start Friday.
