

Halton election briefs

turning officer for Halton East riding in the October 17 provincial election.

Halton East includes land bounded by Oakville and Burlington Town Lines on the west, the Oakville-Toronto Township Line on the east, Lake Ontario on the south and No. 22 sideroad Esquesing on the north. This includes Milton, Georgetown, Oakville and most of Esquesing Township.

Of the 187 polling stations in the riding, 111 are in Oakville, 17 in Milton, 25 in Georgetown and 10 in Esquesing.

The 304 enumerators learned there will be some 40,000 to 50,000 eligible voters for the election in this riding.

For the convenience of these voters who will be unable to get to the polls on October 17, advance polls will be set up on Oct. 12, 13 and 14 from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and from 8 to 11 p.m.

OKAVILLE COUNTING

All of Halton East riding will get some use out of the Oakville Municipal Building October 17, when results are tabulated there for the Provincial election.

At an Oakville meeting it was chosen as the best-equipped building, because, among other things it has a Zenith telephone line, as well as 10 standard wires.

Town Administrator K. Needham suggested the estimated cost of \$150 for the evening's computing be billed to the returning officer.

BLASTS "GO TRANSIT"

GO transit fell under criticism once again when Jack Lush, Halton West Liberal candidate blasted the inadequate service being rendered to Burlington citizens. Complaints about GO have come from residents in Lorne Park and students who ride the GO line to

school in Hamilton and Toronto. Students complained they could get no special student rates. Mr. Lush made the statement to campaign workers at his headquarters in Burlington.

Mr. Lush also criticized the government for failing to bring regulatory measures to halt "Get rich deals for fringe operators". He said the government was not concerned about eroding wastes that constantly demand more tax dollars.

Mr. Lush called for a more business-like approach to government. "Stop-gap measures will not do," he said.

Halton County has been relegated to the third phase of a three-class anti-pollution program, Robin Skuce, Halton East Liberal candidate in the forthcoming election said Sunday.

Mr. Skuce, speaking at a "Meet the Candidate" gathering at Beth El Synagogue in Oakville, said the Conservative government is playing with lives by failing to take effective action on the air and water pollution problems.

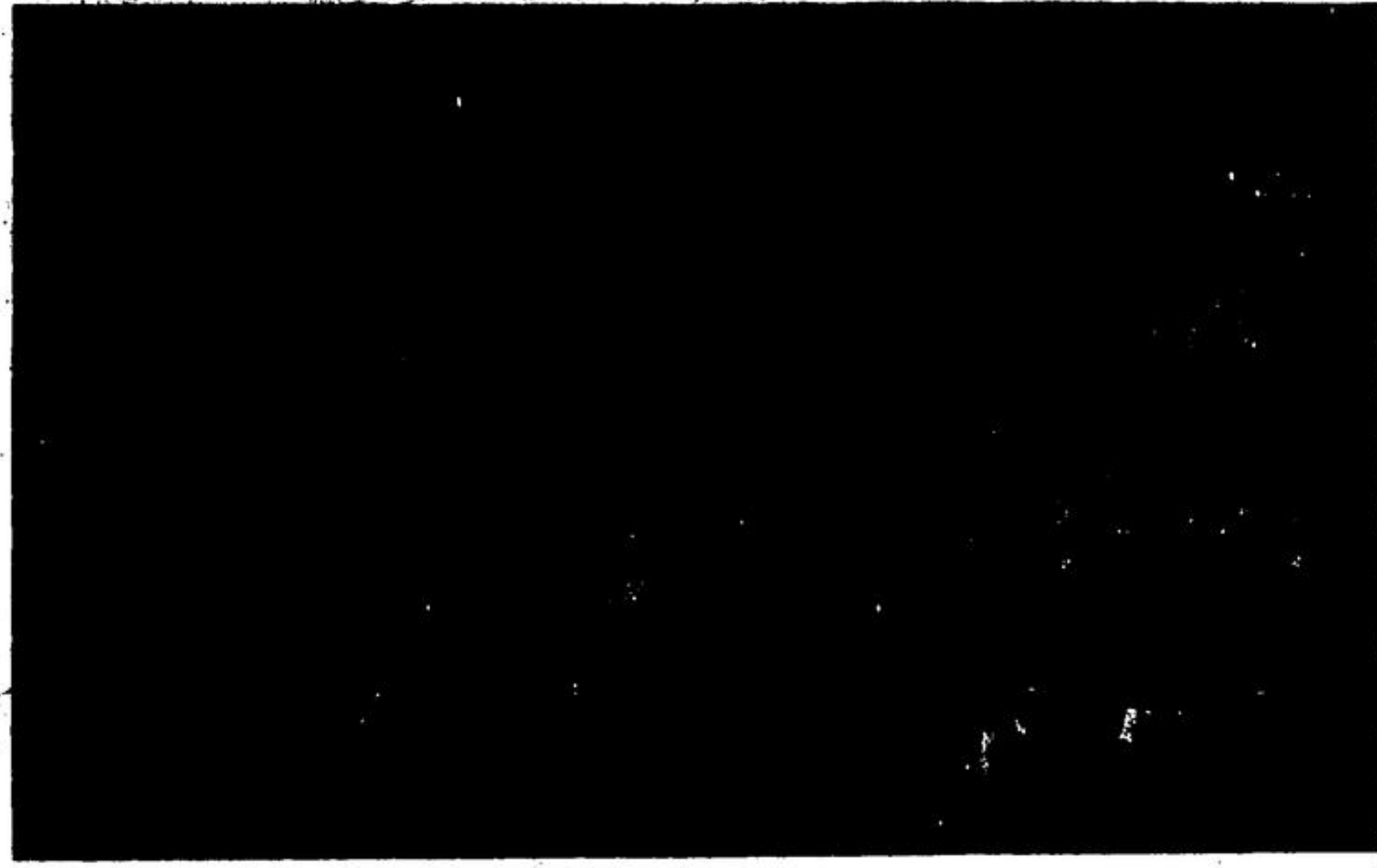


Stewart Franklin Wolf, B.Sc., will join the technical staff of Bearmore and Co. Limited early in October.

Assault, theft investigated

During the week of September 17 to 23 inclusive, personnel of the Milton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 879 and a half hours and patrolled 8,711 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol, 38 charges were preferred, 49 traffic warnings were issued, and 51 vehicles were safety checked. There were 66 convictions registered in Magistrate's court.

Milton O.P.P. report four property damage accidents investigated and two personal injury accidents resulting in two persons being injured, and total property damage of \$2,300 last week. Causes of accidents were inattentive driving, driver lost control, driving on wrong side of road, and drove off roadway. There were four charges laid as a result of these accidents.

There were 48 general occurrences reported during the week, including one assault and three other Criminal Code offences being investigated, theft of a three-quarter-H.P. electric motor stolen from a farm in Nassagaweya Twp. valued at \$85, one stolen motor vehicle recovered for Metro Toronto Police Dept., and one premise found insecure at night.

There were three liquor investigations resulting in seven persons being charged under the Liquor Control Act. All other occurrences were of a minor nature.
