HILLSBURGH:



Edward J. Baranski of R.R. 2, Galt, who owns the factory with his brother Stanley of St. Agatha, estimated the damage at nearly \$50,000. Only about one fifth of this is covered by insurance.

The plant manufactured wooden veneer, thin sheets of wood peeled from logs. Fergus fire brigade answered the call and about an hour later help was obtained from one unit of the Elora Fire Department Because of the age of the building, built in the 1870's, and the wood inside, they were not able to do anything except protect neighboring properties. By the middle of Friday morning, the fire was nearly out although firemen were on duty again Saturday morning trying to wet down stacks of-veneer that were still smouldeeing. The main building in the centre was originally built as a sewing machine factory. Later it became a dye works and then was purchased by the Fergus Basket Works. Mr. Baranski bought the building about 10 years ago.
