Farmers will have the opportunity of seeing the results of various levels of fertility, different varieties, use of starter fertilizers, etc., on this tour. Lunch will be available at the

Corn Day, catered by the Mountain Union Women's Institute. Three special speakers are

scheduled for the afternoon: Dr Jack Tanner, Crop Science Department, Ontario Agricultural College, on Breeding, Future Developments, and Weed Control in Corne; Tom Lane, Soil Science Department, O.A.C., on Fertilizing Your Corne; and Harold Clapp, Dairy Specialist, Ontario Livestrock Branch, on Feeding Com.

The afternoon will conclude with machinery demonstrations. There will be compickers, combines, stalk shredders, corn driers, etc., in operation.

This Corn Day is under the sponsorship of the Soil and Crop Improvement Associations of Halton, Peel and York. Farmers from the counties of Wellington, Wentworth and South Simcoe have also been invited.




