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Esqueusing Council

Letter scores condition of dump

Letters?
Esqueusing township council received one at their Monday meeting regarding the condition of the township dump which raised hackles on all.

Writer was Kent Hallman, a fourth line resident of the township for the past year and a half. He urged stricter control of the dump and restricting dumping days to three a week.

Mr. Hallman felt the township's could take a lesson from the town of Acton's dump which bore a resemblance to the load fill method. He also urged council to consider moving the site.

Smokes and fith from the dump, wrote Mr. Hallman are visible for miles. He felt it was also a fire hazard and the custodian unable to take care of it.

Clerk K.C. Lindsay said it cost Acton \$1100 to dig trenches for dumping in September - five

times as much as the township bill.

Councillor Tom Hill was inclined to go along with the letter writer. He pointed out people from outside the township were using the dump.

He urged council to study methods of regulating dumping to improve its appearance.

Reeve G. Leslie disagreed. He said closing the dump on certain days would only mean garbage would be dumped alongside township roads.

A heated argument ensued with Mr. Hill supporting the writer on some points and the reeve and Mr. Patterson opposing.

It was agreed to answer the letter pointing out the township's position.

Council read a third time and passed a by-law closing Joel St. in Glen Williams. There were no objections registered.

The subject of a new fire hall

to house the proposed Esqueusing bridge appeared briefly but insufficient information on plans to build the hall next to the townships offices were deferred. The municipality owns the land on the east side of the offices.

R. Giles of Glen Williams was present to ask council to change the name of Mountain St. in the Glen to Mountain Road. He told council some deeds said Mountain Rd. on them and residents were worried about the legality of their deeds, especially the ladies.

"You know how the ladies are when they go to church and talk over these things," he told councillors.

Tom Hill reassured Mr. Giles that the new names do not interfere with the deeds. They were only for mail delivery convenience. He said some residents wanted to change Confederation Street to Confederation Square, Bennett Place to something else because no Bennetts lived there now. It was just a symptom of change, he declared.

Reeve George Leslie presided at the meeting with Councillors Hill, Patterson and Goodlet in attendance as well as clerk K.C. Lindsay, assistant Del French, road superintendent Bud Snow, assessor Art Benton and building inspector Tom McLeon.

\$249,700 building permits issued for September in Twp.

Building permits totalling \$249,700 were issued by the township of Esqueusing for the month of September, building inspector Tom McLeon told the township council at their regular meeting Monday.

Big item on the 22-item list was a \$30,000 addition to a hotel in Norval owned by Rossett Bros. Other permits were for new houses and garages.

Councillor C.F. (Pat) Patterson took Mr. McLeon to task for his handling of the trailer issue which has disturbed council the past few meetings.

"If the township is going to be successful controlling trailers you're going to have to be tougher than you are," the Norval district councillor told Mr. McLeon. Mr. Patterson disclosed another trailer was being lived in on Draper St. in Norval. He thought the Health Unit should check it and a septic tank installation on the same street.

Reeve George Leslie asked Mr. Patterson to look after details.

Councillor Patterson also made council aware that a provincial permit had been issued for a trailer park across from Acton park but the reeve said this only permitted the owner to allow trailers to park there for the summer. Permanent parking was out.

Council at their last meeting passed a resolution calling for a trailer permit fees from \$10 to \$20 per month to become effective Jan. 1, 1968.
