

Council hires outside solicitor represent town in drainage case

Two Acton solicitors declared a conflict of interest so number two committee of councilengaged Fred Helson as legal aid to represent the town in the Lakeview subdivision storm water drainage problem.

Council previously complained to contractors building houses about alleged hooking into the sewage system to dispose of excess water and threatened to take legal action.

Builders said they could not get mortgage money unless springs and drains went into sanitary sewers. The onus for disposing of the excess, they claimed, lay

on the town. Mayor Les Duby saidhe checked with the Central Mortgage and Housing and they said no such regulation as claimed by builders existed. Any agreement was up to the parties concerned -town

and contractor. Number two committee spokesman Bob Drinkwalter said his committee would continue to work on the problem. Present strategy consisted of making it mandatory for the purchaser to have a certificate of occupancy before he could move in. This would give the town control of the sit-

Deputy-Reeve F.G. Oakes reminded council home owners could get obnoxious if an inspection is necessary. He advised caution, feeling contractors, not home owners, should be brought to task.

O.P.P. warn litterbugs are liable for fines

Littering is becoming a problem in the North Halton area, and is his weekly press release this week, Milton O.P.P. Sgt. C.J. Parkinson reminds motorists that Section 98 of the Highway Traffic Act provides fines for "litterbugs". Section 98 says: "Every person who throws or deposits or causes to be deposited any glass, nails, tacks or scraps of metal or any rubbish, refuse, waste or litter upon, along or adjacent to a highway, is guilty of the offence of littering the highway and is liable for the first offence to a fine of not less than \$5 and not more than

During the week of September 24 to 30 personnel of Milton Detachment worked a total of 885 and a quarter hours and patrolled 6,381 mileson area highways. As a result of patrol, 30 charges were preferred, 39 traffic, warmings were issued, and 27 vehicles were safety checked. There were 68 convictions registered in Mag-

istrate's Court, Milton. There were five property damage accidents investigated and six personal injury accidents resulting in nine persons being intured, and total property damage of \$5,810. Causes of accidents were inattentive driving, wrong side of road, driver lost control, and improper passing on hill.

There were six charges laid as

a result of these accidents. There were 40 general occurrences reported during this perlod, including two assault investigations resulting in four persons being charged, one theft in Esquesing Twp., one liquor investigation resulting in one person being charged under the Liquor Control Act, one stolen vehicle recovered for other Police Dept., one juvenile person missing from Esquesing Twp., being investigated, and one report of garbage being dumped in Esquesing Twp.






