She admitted she was faced with the problem of talking about writing or reading, and concluded since more people read than

write, she would talk about that. She told of her naughty nephew, who despite apparent intention listened intently as she read; a niece affected very emotionally by books who learned thereby to face reality; and of her trips around the world when the homes of writers were like "shrines" to her.

Actually, she revealed, she learned far more from books than from travelling. This was the subject of one of her poems she recited; the other was about children.

Bolivian Missionaries guests for Thankoffering meeting

Members of the Baptist Mission Circle had as their speaker Mrs. Margaret Cserepka, former missionary in Bolivia, for their fall Thankoffering meeting held in the church Monday night. Dr. Rev. John and Dr. Margaret Cserepka escaped from Hungary shortly after she graduated and they arrived in Toronto in 1957 and received their Canadian citizenship in 1963. The pamphlet "Working with Wool" was given to each member and a discussion on wool fibre was led by Mrs. McCulloch. Seven characteristics are softness, warmth, light in weight, wavy not straight lines, shrinkage, damage by alkali, and that single fibre is weak compared to textile fibres but is durable. The quality of wool fabric depends on the breed of the sheep and care and feeding.

Miss Pearen then tested three pieces of material by the method of burning. Wool will not burn but gives a strong objectionable odor.

A delicious lunch was served by the hostess.
