Urge farm people take driver course

Interested in safe driving town and country folk alike can enroll now in the refresher course in "Modern Driving Techniques," to be conducted by the Ontario Department of Transport and the Hamilton Automobile Club. The course will run for four nights, two nights a week, as follows: Tuesday, October 31 and Thursday, November 2; and Monday, November 6 and Wednesday November 8. The time is from 8 to 10:15 p.m., each night.

The cost of the course will be \$10.00 per person, and \$5.00 will be refunded by the Halton Farm Safety Council, to any farm people who complete the course. Instruction will be given in the Board Room at the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food, 181 Main Street, Milton. A certificate will be issued upon completion of the course.
