In looking over the results I find one hand that gave a few pairs some difficulty. Although few bridge players will admit it, no trump contracts are harder to play, in general, than suit contract. This was one of the no trump variety.

Opening lead - 5 of Hearts I don't agree with the bidding but how else could South get into three no trump. I don't agree with South's first pass. Granted there are only twelve points in the hand but look at the three quick tricks. This must make the hand an opening bid. Fortunately though, North-South never found their spade fit for the split of the outstanding cards would. make four spades most difficult.

On the opening lead of a heart, declarer plays the ten from dummy and wins with the ace when East covers. A low spade is lead and West's queen taken with the ace. Maybe West has a doubleton spade, so declarer should return to his hand with a diamond and lead another spade. When West shows out, declarer plays low and allows East to win with the ten.

East returns his last heart to dummy's king. West should play the seven on this trick. This should not bother South however. If West started with only four hearts, then the most the defense can take is two heart tricks. If West started with five hearts, then East must be out of hearts. So declarer leads another spade

to drive out Easts king. When the diamonds break evenly, there is no problem. Decharer takes two spades, two




