Georgetown loses plastic industry

After an era of unprecedented industrial expansion, Georgetown got the bad news last week that Plat Canada Limited, a firm which employs 150 people, will be moving from Georgetown to

Burlington. The Plax firm, located in a building adjacent to and rented from Smith and Stone Ltd., designs and produces plastic bottles. The company moved to

Georgetown from Oshawain 1953. D. S. Chant, company president said physical limitations of the Georgetown plant do not allow for necessary expansions. A new plant will be constructed at Walker's Line and the Queen Eliza-

The firm expects to move in late 1968. The new site was selected after a scientific study of transportation facilities, taxes and availability of labor.

Henry Martin, executive vicepresident, in an announcement to employees, pointed out, however, the new plant will be within commuting distance of Georgetown. The present staff will be given preference in employment

Plant manager, William Clark will continue in that capacity in Burlington.
