### Employ 150

## Georgetown loses plastic industry

After an era of unprecedented industrial expansion, Georgetown got the bad news last week that Plast Canada Limited, a firm which employs 150 people, will be moving from Georgetown to Burlington.

The Plast firm, located in a building adjacent to and rented from Smith and Stone Ltd., designs and produces plastic bottles. The company moved to Georgetown from Oshawa in 1953.

D. S. Chant, company president said physical limitations of the Georgetown plant do not allow for necessary expansions. A new plant will be constructed at Wal-

ker's Line and the Queen Elizabeth Way.

The firm expects to move in late 1968. The new site was selected after a scientific study of transportation facilities, taxes and availability of labor.

Henry Martin, executive vice-president, in an announcement to employees, pointed out, however, the new plant will be within commuting distance of Georgetown. The present staff will be given preference in employment there.

Plant manager, William Clark will continue in that capacity in Burlington.

## Successful fire prevention week

Fire Prevention Week in Halton County was again a busy one, and members of the Halton Fire Prevention Bureau reported it was a "highly successful" celebration at their October meeting held in Milton last week.

The Bureau's member departments in Acton, Georgetown, Milton and Oakville carried out their own fire prevention program, with the assistance of the Halton Bureau in planning and literature.

Milton firefighters held a successful open house and film night at the fire hall, and conducted drills in town and district schools and institutions such as the hospital, Halton Manor and Ontario School for the Deaf. The Oakville Fire Department had a busy week of promotion which included library displays and school drills, and culminated in the official opening of the new Central Fire Station on Saturday afternoon.

Programs in Acton and Georgetown were similar. Acton firefighters also concentrated on setting up an industrial fire prevention program to encourage industrial employees to be more aware of fire hazards. The Georgetown brigade hosted an open house at the fire hall on three evenings, conducted school drills and inspected commercial

and industrial buildings for fire hazards.

Throughout the county, member departments distributed thousands of pieces of literature and newspaper advertisements were used to remind everyone it was Fire Prevention Week.

During the week, firefighters collected the Grade Five posters to be entered in the Bureau's annual competition. The winners at the county level will be honored at a banquet in November, and the municipal winners will also receive awards from their own fire department.

The Bureau's annual church parade will be held in Georgetown on Sunday morning, October 22. Firefighters from the county will gather at the fair grounds for a parade to the United Church. This annual parade is the climax to Halton's Fire Prevention week activity.
