Saturday Nov. 4, Acton District High School Girls' Athletic Association will be sponsoring a formal dance. Former students from 1962 have been invited. Because this is Centennial Year it is hoped as many former students as possible will come and renew old acquaintances.

The teach-in on Religion and International Affairs, at Varsity arena, Toronto, October 20, 21 and 22, proved very informative for about 10 University of Guelph students and their Anglican chaplain, Rev. Ritchie McMurray. The local group stayed in the parish hall of St. Thomas church, Huron St., which is right on campus, and were assisted by the rector and his wife.

They felt one of the most moving speakers was Thich Nhat Hanh, a Vietnamese Buddhist monk and a founder of the Buddhist University of Saigon, who eloquently expressed his country's wish to be liberated from liberators.

U Thant, another devout Buddhist and secretary-general of the United Nations, made a film especially for the Teach-In, applying non-violent Buddhist concepts to the international situation.

Other impressive speakers were Garfield Todd, former prime minister of Southern Rhodesia, Dr. Alex Quaison-Sackey, former foreign minister of Ghana and Krishna Monon, former Indian defense minister.

Subjects of the various sessions were Religious Faith in relation to War, Revolution, Intolerance, Ideology and Peace.

Another Teach-In will be held in November in McMaster, and some of the U. of G. students will again attend with Mr. McMurray.
