There will definitely be a deer hunt in Halton County next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Nov. 6, 7 and 8, Halton County Game Warden Jim Millford of Oakville said Sunday.

The decision to go shead with the hunt has met with opposition from the Oakville council. Oakville opposed the hunt after receiving complaints from rural north end citizens about property damage done by hunters. Some have reported damage to livestock and tame ducks and one woman reported a 22 rifle bullet was fired through her kitchen

over \$2,000 in crop damage to his farm alone last year when there was no deer hunt in the

Halton Warden William Coulter said county council had decided it would have a hunt only if neighboring Wellington and Wentworth counties went along with the hunt. County council didn't want hunters from all three counties concentrated in Halton.

It was reported Oakville mayor McLean Anderson would protest the hunt but as of Monday the hunt was still on in Halton, Wellington and Wentworth.
