Open deer hunt here next week

There will definitely be a deer hunt in Halton County next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Nov. 6, 7 and 8, Halton County Game Warden Jim Mather of Oakville said Sunday.

The decision to go ahead with the hunt has met with opposition from the Oakville council. Oakville opposed the hunt after receiving complaints from rural north end citizens about property damage done by hunters. Some have reported damage to livestock and tame ducks and one woman reported a 22 rifle bullet was fired through her kitchen window.

Some Milton and Campbellville farmers have complained that deer harm crops. One reported

over \$2,000 in crop damage to his farm alone last year when there was no deer hunt in the county.

Halton Warden William Coulter said county council had decided it would have a hunt only if neighboring Wellington and Wentworth counties went along with the hunt. County council didn't want hunters from all three counties concentrated in Halton, he said.

It was reported Oakville mayor McLean Anderson would protest the hunt but as of Monday the hunt was still on in Halton, Wellington and Wentworth.

No dogs will be allowed in Halton nor will any firearms other than shot guns be allowed.

Announcement has been made that there will be an open deer season in Halton and Wellington this year. The Department of Lands and Forests has pointed out that hunters must present their views to local county council members if there are to be open seasons in the future.

Ontario Hydro reports they are still plagued by so-called sportsmen who use insulators and wires for target practice. They point out the dangers of this practice which could lead to the electrocution of the hunter of an innocent passerby. Other wires don't break for sometime after the insulator is shot and this leads to injury or forest fires.

They also point out anyone convicted of this type of malicious damage is liable to a heavy fine and/or imprisonment.
