Acton rector makes invocation Guelph University convocation

Rev. Ritchie McMurray, Anglican chaplain, was among the many dignitaries present at convocation ceremonies in War Memorial Hall, University of Guelph. Father McMurray invoked God's blessing on the place of learning after the long line of academics in colorful robes had filed into the hall.

Installation of the president and vice-chancellor, William Charles Winegard, who gave the convocation address, followed the invocation. The new president encouraged students to participate more fully in the life of the university. He advocated more exchanges of faculty with other countries on a rotation basis even if it meant increasing numbers and working on a floating basis.

The Very Rev. Roger Swindon O.M.I. vice-chairman of the committee of presidents of Universities of Ontario, representing 14 universities, paid their respects. A number of Anglican students received their Masters degree among them Gerry Arthur Callen of St. John's parish, Rockwood. Chancellor George Drew conferred the degrees.

W.I. members count cars

Members of the Women's Institutes in Esquesing township added a new wrinkle to their programs October 17 and 18.

Twenty of the members of the various W.I.'s throughout the township counted cars at intersections of township roads on the two days. It was all part of a Needs Study authorized by the township and conducted by Tomlinson and Associates, Burlington.

The women were paid \$20 a day working from seven till 11 in the morning and 2 to 6 p.m. In addition to counting cars the women had to report which direction they were heading to show traffic flow.

Originally the count was to have been for one day only, but a delay in setting out the automatic counters which were used in addition to the manual count meant the ladies had to sit two days in pouring rain.
