 The Department of Social and Family Services' director of the homes for the aged branch Noble Drew will share the official opening and ribbon-cutting ceremonies with Halton's 1967 Warden William Coulter of Nassagaways and Simon Henry Baverstock who is 101 and the Manor's oldest resident.
