That year Acton finished second in the group and went on to win the championship in the playoffs. A succession of group titles were accumulated after that, with the ultimate, the O.H.A. "B" crown in 1939.

17 years ago, due to the lack of artificial ice and the refusal to pay imports Acton failed to ice a team. It wasn't till 10 years later that another team was mustered.

Acton hasn't any excuse for no team this year, especially with the innovation of artificial ice in the last few years. It appears that Acton has been running themselves down-hill as far as intermediate hockey goes instead of improving like they should.




