for the past year, was back on the agenda for Esqueing Council at their last regular meeting.

Councillors questioned the cost estimates for the job of straightening out a river bend in the Glen, prepared by engineers of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. Total cost of the project was estimated at \$9,750, \$4,875 of which would be paid by the government, \$4,875 Esqueing's share and a \$487.40 tab picked up by the Conservation Authority.

The C.V.C.A. asked Esqueing for their approval of the cost estimation. The job involves moving 19,200 cubic yards of earth so the river bed can be straightened to alleviate spring flood conditions in the Glen.

Councillor Pat Patterson wanted to know if Esqueing people

got a chance to quote on the job. He felt the charge of \$30 an hour for a bulldozer was exorbitant.

"The C.V.C.A. does a job. They're a law unto themselves," commented Reeve G. Leslie.

Addressing Councillor T. Hill, Mr. Patterson asked if he couldn't do anything about it since he was council's member on the Conservation Authority.

"No," said Mr. Hill. "They do everything. This is what they call phase one."

"Why don't we have a say? They're spending our money," retorted Councillor Patterson. "We should write them a letter saying we can rent a bulldozer cheaper than that," answered Mr. Hill.

It was agreed a letter to the Authority might make them more receptive to the idea of accepting Esqueing suggestions.
