Two Oakville winners fire poster contest

Two young Oakville students have been named first prize winners in the Halton Fire Prevention Bureau's annual fire prevention poster contest. They are Kathleen Higgins, nine, a student of Woodside Public School and Alan Cartwright, 11, of Sunnydale Public School. Four honorable mention prizes are being awarded to other deserving students -- Cindy Barr of M.Z. Bennett school in Acton, Christopher Schouten of Holy Rosary school in Milton, Robert Boisclair of Speyside school in Esquesing Township, and Joni Parson of J.M. Denyes school in Milton. The six winners were named in the 11th annual Grade Five fire prevention poster contest the Bureau has sponsored. Every Grade Five student in the county was invited to submit a poster on the theme "Fire Prevention in the Home" and after area winners were named, the posters went on to the Halton-wide contest. Judges awarded their prizes on the basis of originality of thought, design, artwork and the fire prevention message the posters contained. Bureau chairman William Hyde of Georgetown explained. Both winners' posters indicated the students' concern for fire danger in the home. Kathleen's showed examples of improper electrical fusing, flammable liquids improperly stored, fire exits blocked off, an un-

screened fireplace, smoking in bed, oily rags, an unattended iron and defective wiring. Alan's poster was based on the slogan "Keep matches out of the reach of small children" and showed a fire about to happen as a toddler investigated the mysteries of a box of matches.

John and Kathleen will be honored by the Bureau at a banquet in Milton Fire Hall on Tuesday, November 28. Their parents, teacher and principals will also attend, as will Bureau representatives and councillors from around Halton County and spokesmen for provincial and federal fire-fighting agencies.

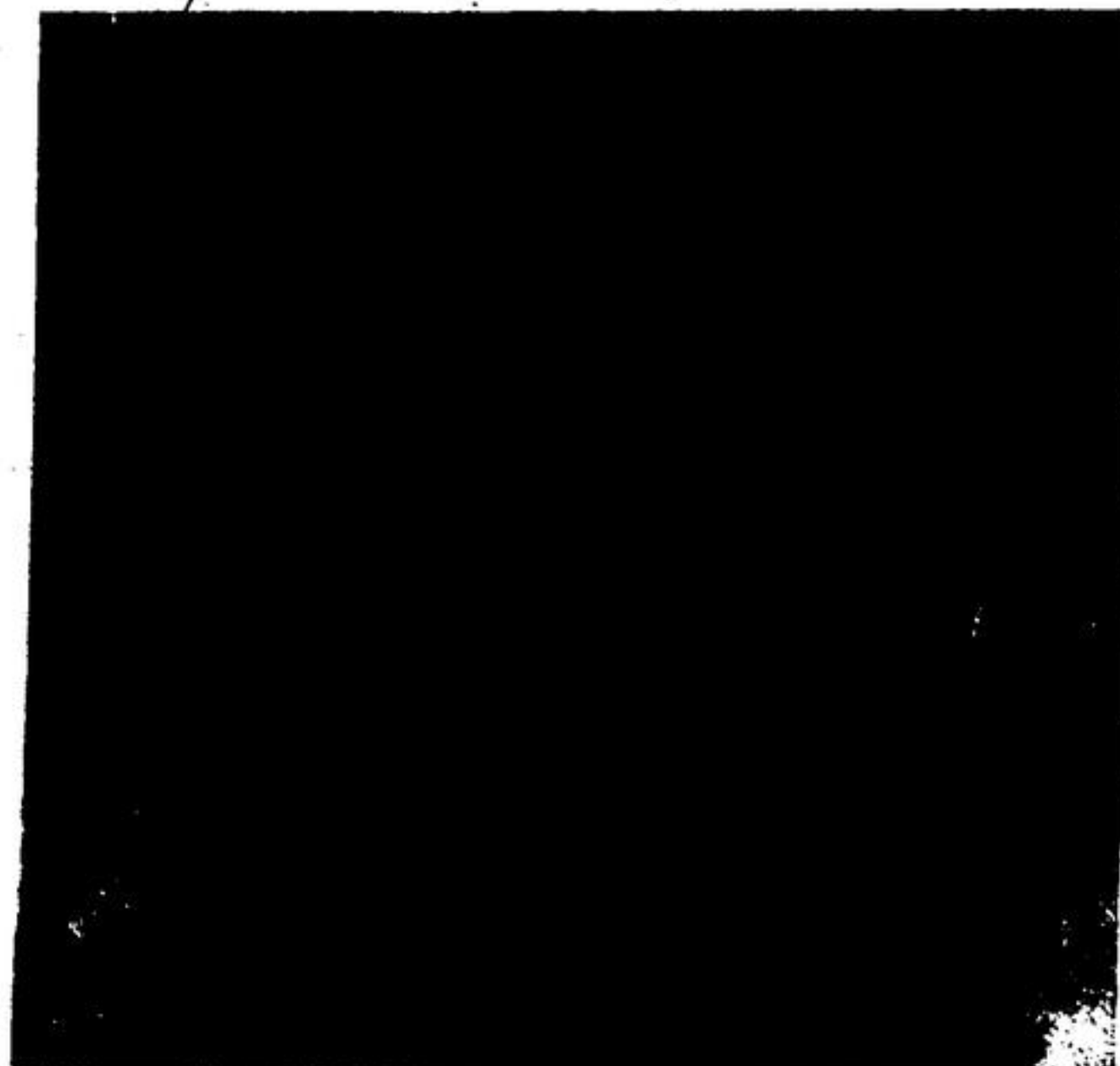
Each of the two first prize winners will receive a personal trophy, and their schools will receive the Halton Mutual Fire Insurance Company trophies. Honorable mention certificates will be distributed later to the four other prizewinners. The guest speaker is to be Edgar W. Foster, the supervising principal of Milton Public Schools.

Both winners' posters will be sent on later this year to an Ontario-wide competition, sponsored by the Ontario Fire Chiefs' Association. This provincial contest is patterned after the Halton competition, and offers two \$100 bonds to the first prize winners.
