

Each of the two first prize winwill receive a personal trophy, and their schools will receive the Halton Mutual Fire Insurance Company trophies. Honorable mention certificates will be distributed later to the four other prizewinners. The guest speaker is to be Edgar W. Foster, the supervising principal of Milton Public Schools.

Both winners' posters will be sent on later this year to an Ontario-wide competition, sponsored by the Ontario Fire Chiefs' Association. This provincial contest is patterned after the Halton competition, and offers two \$100 bonds to the first prize winners.
