The group causing the most forest fires in the Chapleau area this year was railway crews. Railways caused seven of the 19 forest fires in that area. Fishermen and hikers were the cause of four fires. Lightning, hunters and woods employees caused two each while children and road employees caused one each.

The Ontario Department of Lands and Forests has been experimenting with aerial seeding of trees in areas that have been burnt or cut off. First the area to be seeded is gone over with bulldozers pulling steel drums or lengths of heavy spiked anchor chains to flatten the remaining growth in the area. It takes over 500 bushels of tack pine cones to seed 150 acres.

For all of us there is a time to live and a time to die, and it should be that way for wild game

The problem is that there are humans roaming the woods in the guise of hunters who have never learned when to stop killing.

We see evidence of it along back roads - a deer carcass with the hind quarters cut away or bits of bones left from a "summer" kill. You see it in the duckmarshes - ducks left at the landing that would not fit into a man's legal limit. We see It in the hardwood a partridge gone to waste because a man shot too far for a clean kill and we see it also

along the creeks and rivers a dead mink or beaver with a

with a bullet hole in its head. You hear it where men gather to sip beer and talk about the big kill, the easy kill, or the illegal kill. We hear it in small and medium sized towns, even big cities, for the men who can't stop killing are never definable by the size of the community, nor by the cut of their clothes. You can't set the activity apart by species. Anywhere there is something wild in the bush you can bet your best shotrun someone somewhere is figuring out a way to kill it without being caught. It happens with sourrels and rabbits as well as deer and the occasional moose.

The man who kills within the framework and limits of the hunting regulations is a different breed of cat. He tempers his killing with respect for the animal he pursues. He sees a wildthing not only as a target but as a living breathing creature with more freedom than he, himself will ever have. He takes that life and that freedom if he can, only if the law permits, and he may even do it with some regret. He stands with the majority of hunters. But the others?

These are so-called men who seemingly can't stand to see any bird or animal alive in the woods. They will blast an otter into eternity while hunting for ducks! They will riddle a beron with bird shot if there is nothing else in the air to shoot! They will kill simply because, while carrying a gun, they have found something with life which can be rendered dead!

These are the ones with black and white values. A gun is to shoot. A bird or animal is meant to be shot. The person with thoughts so endowed is no more than a child with a man's body wearing a man's boots - no more. For Mim there is no time to live - only a time to die.


