One Tanner fan was wondering why programs weren't given out before each game to see who was playing in the game that night on the Acton team.



In the lower Great Lakes, particularly, pollution and enrichment over the last two decades have resulted in biological, physical and chemical alterations of the environment for fish. The walleye, lake trout and whitefish have reached low levels of abundance while alewife, white bass, white perch and smelt are predominate. While this particular problem is not as marked in Lake Huron and is practically non-existant in Lake Superior, another factor has caused definite changes in the fisheries here; the parasitic, sea lamprey. Production of lake trout in these lakes, for example, has gone from a yearly average of 15 million pounds to less than half a million pounds, mainly because of this predator.


