Extinct in Ontario for the past 60 years, elk returned to Halton on Saturday when the Halton Region Conservation Authority shipped in five young animals from Alberta to expand a game preserve in a valley beside Rattlesmake Point Park.

Photographers, staffers and curious visitors had a hey-day watching the five scared elk being unloaded from trucks and released in the 75-acre compound at the north end of Walker's Line that already houses five

buffalo. Both the bison and the elk were gifts of the federal government, from the Elk Island National Park near Calgary, Alta. The Rattlesnake area is believed compatible with the animals' natural habitat in Alberta. There

is plenty of land for browsing and if the snow is too deep. their feed will be supplemented with grain.

The buffalo H.R.C.A. brought to Ontario two years ago seem to be thriving in their new home, although they are not reproducing yet. "Bobby" the bull buffalo wasn't oldenough until this winter to father any offspring, but officials are hoping to have some "blessed events" next spring,

He has four female companions in the grassy, treed, and rolling enclosure nestling below the Niagara Escarpment within easy viewing distance of Rattlesnake Point Park. The fenced enclosure gives the animals the cover they require, yet they are frequently seen in the open fields or obtaining food at the Walker's

Wildlife technicien Frank Timmermans of the H.R.C.A. and Maurice Reachead, a former works superintendent for the Authority who retired last year, flew west to Alberta two weeks ago to pick up the elk, All the animals had survived a 60-day penned-up quarantine prior to their departure for Ontario.

They were crated and placed on a train for the long journey eastward, and Frankand Maurice stayed close to their charges to ensure they were fed properly. The train pulled into Hamilton railway station Saturday morning and within three hours the animals had been released in their new home at Rattlesnake.

Mr. Timmermans saidthe lone bull in the herd would weigh 600 lbs. and would probably grow to 800 or 900 lbs. at maturity. His horns were shorn for the transporting because of the dimensions of the narrow crate he occupied on the train, He'll grow a new set by spring. All four females should be expecting calves in the spring, he said,

Here is a hand of the latter type. This hand occurred at the regular Monday evening meeting of the Acton

The bidding: EAST SOUTH WEST NORTH 3 C 3 S 4 H Pass All Pass

Opening lead - club four. East has a good non-vulnerable

pre-emptive bld. The three club bid really crowded the bidding. East-West did not sacrifice at five hearts since there was a good chance of defeating the four spade contract. However, four spade can and should be made.

Declarer has no choice but to win the opening lead. There appears to be two diamond losers and two heart losers since West has bid hearts. In the winner column there are six spades, one diamond and one club. There is, however, a good chance of setting up a diamond in which case a heart can be discarded from dummy and a heart ruff would

make 10 tricks. At all cost, East must be kept off the lead.

One round of trump takes out the opponent's trump. Adiamond is led to the ace and a low diamond returned. Declarer should fust cover whichever card East plays. West can win with the 10 but he is end played. That is, he won't give declarer a trick but he cannot lead hearts.

West's best play is to take the diamond king and lead his last\_ club. Declarer is home free. He ruffs the club and cashes the thirteenth diamond, discarding a heart from dummy. Now his only remaining loser is one heart.

If declarer had played the diamond queen earlier, West would take his king and East's jack would be a winner. Now East could lead a heart and declarer goes down.

"We are not against area government but we are disturbed that we haven't been consulted about it." This was the reaction of Mayor John Campbell of Fergus to a report that a submission to be made to the area government study in Waterloo includes Fergus and surrounding area as part of it. W.R. Thomson, planning director of the city of Kitchener, and the Kitchener planning board have prepared a 100-page brief that calls for a 900-square-mile super city that includes all of Waterloo county and the southern half of Wellington, as far north as Fergus and Elora. This brief will be submitted to the officials of the Waterloo County local government study that is working in Kitchener at the present time. The first word that Fergus officials had of this idea was from newspaper reports. Both Mayor Campbell and Fergus clerk David Low expressed the same thoughts. They were surprised that the town had not been consulted before they were included.
