A report submitted to Nassagaweya Council this week shows an increase of \$493,875 over last year's total assessment. This represents an increase of 10.71 per cent over the total assessment for 1966.

Of the total assessment 66,92 per cent is levied on residential and farm properties; 25,54 per cent Commercial and Industrial, and 7.54 per cent in business assessment.

The same report shows Nassagaweya has grown from 2,804 to 2,894 in population.

Members of the County Court of Revision will be paid \$40 a day or \$20 a half day, County Council agreed recently in setting the fee for the members who

will spend 25 days hearing assessment appeals in the various municipalities.

An amendment suggesting \$30 a day was defeated. Deputy-Reeve Frank Rogers, Burlington noted younger people were being named to the board and the duties of the Court require 25 consecutive days away from one's bus-

iness or profession. *To get the people we want we have to pay them what they deserve", he argued.

The former rate was \$25 a day plus expenses and Reeve H. Hinton, Acton argued that \$30 per day would be a "very substantial amount. His amendment to reduce the amount was lost.

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
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
