Final meeting

Esquering council cleans year's slate

Final meeting for Esquering Council was held on Wednesday, December 15, and members also met as a Court of Revision to clear up the year's business.

Claims for sheep killed or injured by dogs in the township were paid to W.L. McDonald \$10 and A.N. Stark \$5 for a trip. W. L. McDonald was also paid \$5 for destroying a dog. Bob Pelletier and Jim Forbes will each receive \$7 for destroying foxes.

Council instructed the clerk to write the Credit Valley Conservation Authority stating Esquering was not satisfied with the individual quotations on the channel improvement at Glen William and would like a meeting with Conservation authorities at the earliest possible date to discuss them.

T.H. Van Sicker was appointed to the Georgetown district high school board for 1968 and 1969.

James McPhail and Denny Charles, both of R.R. 2, Georgetown, were appointed to the Committee of Adjustment for a two

year term. Paul Armstrong, Georgetown, and James Sproat, Milton, were appointed to the Board of the Sunshine school for 1968 and 1969.

Council passed a resolution that the corporation take no proceedings against Messrs. Joseph Kremer or Norman Johnson in respect of a conveyance of land Lot 30, Concession 9, dated October 24th, 1967, and registered November 8, 1967, respectively as Instruments Numbers 236180

and 236181, wherein conveyances were registered of 10 acre parcels with frontages of less than 570 feet each, following approval thereof by the Committee of Adjustment of the Township of Esquering in pursuance of its power to approve minor variances, and that said conveyance not be deemed invalid pursuant to By-Law No. 28-66.

Council adjourned to meet as a Court of Revision with Reeve Leslie in the chair and passed a resolution authorizing rebates on

taxes amounting to \$452.70. Taxes amounting to \$150.94 were written off.

Adjourning as a Court of Revision and meeting as a Council members passed a resolution that all full time township employees be given a turkey as a gift in appreciation of their services.

With retiring reeve George Leslie vacating the chair and his successor reeve-elect George Currie wielding the gavel, Council passed a final resolution that their thanks be extended to Reeve George Leslie for the courteous and impartial manner in which he presided over the meetings during the past year.
