Rudds return on furlough in spring may not be allowed to return

Another interesting letter has been received from the Rev. and Mrs. Jim Rudd, missionaries in India. Mr. Rudd was formerly minister of Acton Baptist church.

Andra Pradesh, India November, 1967

Dear Friends,

Our hot-weather has changed suddenly into the cool season, and with this hint of winter comes thoughts of Christmas and of our friends and family at home.

It was two years ago New Year's Day that a group of Christian District officers and their wives met nearby for a holiday meal together. They felt at the time that they would like to continue to meet fairly regularly for Bible studies, social times, etc. Recently these young married couples have been meeting in this way, and we have enjoyed helping them with their studies etc.

Members of that same group who know English and who like to sing English hymns wanted to have regular English services in the Srikakulam church. Jim has been conducting these Sunday evening services twice monthly for a fair group of Christians as well as for non-Christian students who want to improve their English.

During the first week of August the Million Gospels Crusade came to Srikakulam led by the Rev. Howard Fordham. With the use of a sound truck we joined with them in the sale of about 16,000 copies of the Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles in the bazaars of Srikakulam and area. The cost of the portions of Scripture used in this Crusade was subsidized by the Canadian and the American Bible Societies.

Another project which we have told you about before is the local Christian reading room next to the church. Its main ministry is its witness to the people who enter to read attractive literature. It serves as a channel through which good Christian literature comes into the hands of the Christian folk, and many Hindus also buy portions of Scripture and other Christian books at the reading room.

Recently due to a reduction in the budget it has been impossible to maintain an attendant in the reading room, so we are using a new method of staffing it. We asked for lay volunteers who give two hours a week to the Lord, and drew up a schedule whereby the reading room could be open from 8 to 10 in the morning and from 4.30 to 6.30 in the evening. These are the peak hours for students and businessmen. We are in the process of evaluating this method, and hope that it may be a permanent answer to our staff problem.

So much for recent happenings in the Srikakulam Town area. In the Tekkali and Srikakulam Fields there are four fairly new, young workers. We told you earlier that K.P. GnanaPrakash Rao had come to the Tekkali church.

B. James Roy has come to be pastor of the Callingsapatnam church. His father is a teacher there. Evangelist S.N. George has come to take the place of A. Ramanarasu in Singapuram. Mr. Ramanarasu is now ordained and is doing fine work in the Anakapalle church.

M. Nuka Razu has returned as a pastor to Veeravaram, and M. Devadas has come to take his place in the Manchililapeta area. We told you some time ago that the Manchililapeta church had been washed away by high water. The people are now ready this month to lay the foundation stone for a new church.

Jim has felt that one of his most valuable activities during this last year of our first term in India has been holding regular one-day retreats with these, and other, young pastors each month. They met for Bible study and prayer, and have an opportunity to discuss mutual problems and plan future work.

For the past two years Jim has been Secretary of the Convention Board of Evangelism. In this capacity he has become acquainted with evangelistic efforts and personnel on the Convention-wide level. He has just completed arrangements for the 1967 Simultaneous Evangelism Campaign in the Godavari Association. The pastors from each church in that Association call a pastor from one of the other two Associations to conduct a week-long campaign in his church. Jim has been away this week visiting the churches that are now holding this campaign.

Two years ago we told you about how wonderfully the people of Chintavasa were responding to the Gospel. A. Ramanarasu had been working with them for several years, and it was during a Simultaneous Evangelism Campaign that many people confessed their faith in Jesus Christ and asked for baptism.

However, as is often the case when there has been great spiritual victory, Satan began to work especially hard through one teacher of that village who professes to be a Christian. He appears to be jealous of another teacher who, along with his family are the leaders of the Christian community there. He has influenced the elders of the village to ostracize the Christian family so that no one in the village will have nothing to do with them. The new Christians, who are young in the faith and are mostly farm labourers, do not seem to be strong enough to stand up against him.

Please pray that the heart of this offender will become truly repentant, and that the Christian witness of that place may continue. The Christians do need our prayers that they will remain true to Christ in every situation and circumstance.

In April the children and I left for our first visit to the hill station of Kodakulam in South India. The American school there conducted a two-month kindergarten which Barbara happily attended. This is the school the children will attend as boarding students if we are allowed another term in India, so it was nice to become

acquainted with the school and also to have a most delightful holiday. Jim joined us in May, and we all returned to Srikakulam the middle of June.

Yes, our furlough time is almost here. Our tentative plans are to sail from Bombay on April 19 and to arrive in San Francisco on June 3, 1968. One big question still on our minds is, "Will we be allowed to return to India after our furlough in 1969?" As you know, the Indian government has placed the same restrictions upon Commonwealth missionaries entering India as American missionaries have experienced. No new missionaries have come in under our Board, and so far all of the returning ones have come to work in medical or educational institutions. At the moment we feel a little more optimistic than we did a few months ago, however.

We as a family have all been well during the past year. Jonathan had a mild case of measles, but did not pass them on to the others. The children (Barbara 5, Peter 3-1/2 and Jonathan 2) have other children their own ages to play with, so every day is a busy and happy one for them.

Last of all, we wish every one of you an abundance of the peace and joy which Jesus Christ can give. May he bless you with all the joys that He came to earth to bring — this holiday season.
