In 1926 he was a Liberal candidate in the federal election. He held many positions in Boston Presbyterian Church, and he was a Dufferin School trustee for 30 years.

A bachelor, he lived with his sister until her death in a car accident eight years ago. Since then he had lived with Mr. and Mrs. S. Brown, R.R. 3, Milton. The funeral service was held Monday with interment in Fairview Cemetery, Acton.
