

# Senior, junior high school cagers defeat Galt Panthers, Milton O.S.D.

Acton Senior Redmen extended their winning streak to three games with a 44-36 win over Glenview High School from Galt. The Redmen had previously defeated Glenview in Galt 36-35 and Milton O.S.D. in Acton 33-27.

On December 21, Acton journeyed to Glenview, a new "A" class school in Galt. The Seniors played a good game against the towering Glenview Panthers, dominating the play with a swift attack. The whole Acton team figured in the scoring but Phil Dupuis led the Redmen with 11 points.

Last Tuesday, January 9, Milton O.S.D. came to Acton High. This was Acton's first league game and the Redmen played poorly against a surprising Milton team.

The Acton team seemed to try and imitate the rough style of play of the Milton team, which made for a sloppy game. Phil Dupuis kept Acton in the game with his playmaking, also scoring 16 points.

Friday, the Panthers came to Acton for a return bout. The Acton team played a tremendous game against the hustling Panthers, who were out for revenge. Glenview was behind six points after the first 30 seconds of play. Acton went in and scored on a play off the jump and Glenview couldn't break Acton's novel zone press. They gave the ball away twice to Acton defenders who went in and scored four quick points. It took the first quarter for the Panthers to figure out Redmen coach Ron McCallum's unique defense.

There were no real individual stars for the Redmen, as it was a team effort. Bill Landsborough scored 10 points to lead the Redmen and was followed by Fred Flisak with nine. Phil Dupuis with eight, Dave Woodhouse with seven, Bob Turkosz with six and Alan McNabb, who was fouled out in the third quarter, had four points.

One of the largest crowds ever to see a game at Acton showed up for the first half of the game. Most promptly disappeared after the 3:35 bell. Those who left missed a thriller as both teams pressed to the end.

The future looks rosy for the Redmen as their plays are starting to jell and they are playing as a unit. The tallest man on the team, John McGeechie, has been out with a back injury and his return will help them considerably.

In junior action, Acton defeated Milton O.S.D. 38-36 in a hard fought game. Steve Robb, who has been out with a broken arm, returned to the lineup and was the individual star of the game, bagging 24 points. Steve, the leader Acton needs, amazed the crowd with his jump shots and fine playmaking.

Dave Broostad netted five points, John Grace three, and Allan Gordon, Joe Petric and Dave Manes each got two.
