15 SIDEROAD IN POOR SHAPE

Dear Sir;

It is high time something was done about the disgusting condition of the 15th Sideroad in the Townships of Esquesing and Nassagaweya. On December 23 this road was

reported under water between Speyside and the Town Line. On Dec. 30 (at the time of writing) this road is still in perilous condition. True, on Dec. 23 "Water over Road signs were posted, but by Dec. 30, the danger is no longer just water over the road, but a foot deep washout. How many shocks, springs and front ends have suffered due to these misleading signs will never be known. How many drivers and passengers suffering near apoplexy, not to speak of wet feet, also remains a mystery.

The conditions of this road is inexcusable. Repairs could have been made on the 24th of December. Police, doctors, firemen, etc., who have a public responsibility fulful their obligations, so should those responsible for road safety.

It may be pointed out that thousands of dollars have been spent on our county roads; well, unless this money is spent wisely, it might as well be loaded into dump trucks and dropped into the nearest washout. In this particular part of the 15th Sideroad, washouts are an annual occurrence. proving road maintenance, culverts, fill, etc., in the past, have been a waste of time and money. I would suggest Halton's "Good Roads Committee " takes this road, on their annual outing, when they are congratulating themselves on what a good job they have

done. suggest further, they make the trip in the a.m. one winter's day. They may be surprised to find all the lines sanded and ploughed, but the County Roads snowed under, like glass, and/or

washed out. It seems to me that if the County Engineer's Dept. purchased a few lengths of structural steel, such as are used in constructing temporary air-strips, these sections could be quickly assembled over such washouts and could remain in position until spring, when permanent repairs could be made.
