Only two shooters showed up at Maple Rock Shooting range this week. George Harris came up with 20 while Brad Mainprise came up with 14. The activity will get into full swing in a month or so with the start of the spring season.

Improved deer hunting this year, reported from most sections of southern Ontario, was largely the result of better weather. In 1966, amuch rain hampered hinters during the season.

The improvement was least noticeable in Parry Sound forest district, where weather was not bad last year, Reports from 300 bunt camps indicate that 36,3 per cent of the hunters were success ful in setting deer, compared with 33.4 per cent last year. However this success rate was not uniform aurous the district. The heat hunding was in the southern part of the district where it was antremely good.

In Lindsay forest district the success reported by 145 mint camps was 48.7 per cent, a small increase over the 45.0 per bent reported. by the same camps in 1966. The overall success reported at the checking stations, including casual as well as organized hinters, increased from 16.5 per cent in 1966 to 22.6 per cent in 1967.

Tweed shows an even more dramatic improvement in hunter success. The weather there last year was unfavourable for hunting . with heavy rain every day but one of the first week and only 17.4". per cent of the hunters obtained deer. The much improved weather in 1967 resulted in a hunter success of 26.4 per cent.

On the Bruce Peninsula hunter success is always low because of the large percentage of casual hunters,

The three-day season in Lake Simcoe forest district went well, with several areas open for the first time in many years providing about 20 per cent success.

Farther north, the better weather conditions also helped hunting. In Pembroke forest district hunter success increased from 10.4 per cent in 1966 to 16.1 per cent in 1967.

Unfortunately, there was rain in North Bay forest district and although complete figures are not available, it is expected that hunter success will remain about as low as in 1966, 5,4 per cent. There was some evidence of an increase in deer numbers on the Sucbury mainland with slightly improved hunter success in the Lake Penage area for the first time in many years. On Manitoulin Island there were a few more hunters and a few less deer killed than in 1966. The numbers of husters checked at the Little Current checking station increased from 4,027 in 1966 to 4,377 in 1967. The number of deer checked decreased from 1,177 to 1,149, This decreased the hunter success from 29,2 per cent to 26,2 per cent but it was still considered a good hunt.

Figures are not yet complete in Sault Ste. Marie forest district but hunter success appears to be down a little from the very high 30.0 per cent success recorded last year. The weather was not particularly good and results were quite variable. Around Sault Ste. Marie itself, the bunter success was 16,2 per cent whereas in the Blind River area it was up to 38.4 per cent.

The percentage of fawns checked was very high in nearly every district. For example, in Parry Sound forest district 37,6 per cent of the deer checked were fawns. This is the highest percentage on record. In Tweed, the percentage was even higher at 39.1 per cent and in Pembroke it was 43.8 per cent of the total deer shot. If a few more mild winters allow this kind of reproduction to contime, we should soon have better hunting through this whole area, But a winter with deep snow could very easily wipe out all gains which have been made in recent years. Altogether it must be conmidered a satisfactory season across southern Ontario.


