

West led the heart tack and declarer had a chance. Depending on the opponents you could tinesse or win with the ace. Probably the finesse is correct. East wins and leads a small heart to dummy's ace. The club suit is started and East will win the ace sooner or later.

If East continues hearts declarer makes over tricks. If East finds the diamond switch, declarer will still make his contract. I am afraid that most Easts would continue the heart

When East shows out on the second round of spades there is an automatic finesse against West jack. This is the way it went and declarer ended up taking ten
