Peewees lose 7-1 to Guelph

Guelph's Pee Wee team proved too much for the Acton Y's Men's squad in a game here last Wednesday as they ran up a 7-1 win. The visitors scored six second period goals to make it convincing.

The Y's Men got back on the right foot in an exhibition Sunday, however, edging the Legion four town tourney team 3-2 in a tight match.

There was no score in the first period of their contest with Guelph and Acton took the lead on a goal by Billy McGilloy from Steve McIntyre. Then came the delight of six goals. Guelph got another in the third period.

Ricky Bonnette was a standout for the Y's Meningoal, especially on a penalty shot awarded to Guelph when he made a sparkling save.

A goal by Tim McIntyre in the first period gave the Tri-County club the win over the Legion league team. Both clubs matched goals in the second and third periods.
