Occurrences in the town requiring police investigation or intervention and resulting in criminal and liquor charges showed a great increase in our reporting week of January 21 to January 27, 1968. In all, 10 complaints were lodged at the Acton Police Office. Three Liquor Control Act and three Criminal Code charges were laid when investigations were complete.

Traffic activities encountered in the same time period saw 232 man hours worked and 866 patrol miles logged on the Acton cruiser. Eleven traffic charges and 10 traffic warnings were issued.

The two motor vehicle accidents reported during the week were both of a minor nature. No one was injured, but a total of \$525. damage was done to the four cars involved.

At Traffic Court in Milton, Ontario, five persons answered charges. All five were convicted and paid fines and costs amounting to \$178.
