The Sunday school are supporting the training of a nurse in India, including her uniform and expenses. The sum of \$75 was also sent to United Promotions. Mrs. John McDougall gave the financial report for the Sunday school.

The Christian Women's Fellowship held 12 regular meetings with an average attendance of 10. Studies for the year were "Disciples of Christ in Canada" and "Faiths next door" which were both very interesting.

Friday pancake breakfast: the group also entertained the ladies of Central district for their Spring Rally; they also held a bake sale, and a Centennial Christmas Tea, with ladies from the surrounding churches present, speaker for the occasion being Mrs. A. Walker from Guelph Conference Grounds.

Supplies were sent to Miss Alice Portier, a missionary nurse in India. The sick and shut-ins are remembered with gifts during the year and at Christmas. Mrs. J. Hortop's financial report for C. W. F. showed the members' concern for others, both at home and on the mission field.

The Christian Youth Fellowship is a combined group from Brock Rd, Guelph and Everton Churches, meeting once a week for study. Donna Fountain from Everton is president and Elaine White, Guelph, is treasurer. Among their activities during the year was a Christmas Carol Sing from which the offering of \$22. was sent to Canadian Save the Children Fund; and a Good Friday breakfast.

THE NEW ANIMAL SCIENCE and Nutrition building scheduled as part of the multi-million dollar construction program at the University of Guelph will be completed sometime in 1968. Cost including furnishings is \$7,400,000. Part of the Agricultural College, the building will provide space for 400 undergraduates.

It will afford some of the most modern and extensive facilities for basic research in nutrition, genetics and reproductive physiology using small and large animals ranging in size from mice to bulls. The building will also house the University's data processing centre. Architects are Mathers and Haldenby.

14 die on roads in North Halton

1967 - color it black. North Halton indicate 1967 was the worst year on record. Fourteen were killed, 276 persons were injured and property damage totalled \$356,410 - and all three figures topped all previous records for any single year.

Milton C.P.P., who patrol the township and county roads in Nassagaweya and Esqueving Townships plus Highways 7, 25 and 401 in the North Halton area, released the year-end figures on 1967 this week. The only figure that did not surpass previous annual totals was the number of accidents - 487.

The 14 fatalities topped the previous record of 12 in 1965. In the past seven years 82 persons have lost their lives in highway accidents in this area, for an average of over seven per year. To date in 1968 the detachment office has recorded three more traffic deaths on Highway 401 in the Milton area. Here is a tabulation of the past seven years' figures:
