Esqueving grants \$200 toward rehabilitating Worden cemetery

The pioneer burying ground at the corner of the fifth line and No. 7 highway, familiarly known as Worden's cemetery, will be awarded a \$200 grant towards further rehabilitation, Esqueving Council decided Monday night.

Bannockburn W.L. has been looking after improvements in the cemetery, erecting stone gatepost and planning for a fence.

Walter Linham and R. L. Davidson approached township council to ask for the same support other cemeteries in the township have received under the Act. Mr. Linham acting as spokesman, informed council the clerk was of the opinion they had already received the money.

Reeve George Currie told the deputation he never thought so. Mrs. Lindsay admitted he looked the records up back to 1956 and he could find no record of it so he now assumed he was mistaken.

"I was sure all along you never got that grant," said the Reeve. "I move a resolution these gentlemen got the same grant as the others got," proposed Deputy Reeve T. Hill.

"Two hundred dollars to stop a cemetery from being a charge on the township is money well spent," declared the Reeve. He reviewed the recent improvements in the cemetery at Stewart town and reminded it was "compulsory to keep old cemeteries up."
