Youth programs sponsored by various departments of the provincial government were outlined by Hon. Rene Brunelle, guest speaker at the Ontario forestry association's annual dinner meeting held at Toronfo's Royal York Hotel on Jamary 24th.

The lands and forests Minister explained his department's junior Jorest ranger program, its work with boys from the Bowmanville training school, two summer projects involving indian and non-Indian boy scouts on the Winisk River near James Bay and an outdoors program in Quetico provincial park arranged by stair members of Atikokan High School for students of both sexes.

Mr. Brunelle had high praise for junior farmers and 4-H clubs. He commended the Ontario forestry association for its popular resource rangers program.

"As a further example of its interest in young people, I might point out that the department of lands and forests has a youth. groups' conservation trophy which is awarded annually by the Ont-. ario federation of anglers and hunters. It is presented to the group which the federation feels has made the most progress and the greatest contribution in the protection, betterment and wise use of renewable, natural resources," the Minister said.

Mr. Brunelle said that "by these lew references to youth programs you can see that Ontario is certainly not indifferent to the needs of this age group.
