Well-known sports personality Garnet L. (Doc) Harkley dies

Ill since he suffered a heart seizure last May, one of Acton's best-known sports personalities died at Geoph's General Hospital Saturday, February 3.

Garnet Leo (Doc) Harkley, 48, a familiar and likable figure in the minor hockey system in Acton for many years, succumbed to the illness which curtailed the activity he liked best - working with the kids.

He was a one man gang when it came to organizing sports for boys. Consumed by a desire to get things done, he unabashedly with the help of a few other men, organized and promoted Tri-County hockey here, laying the groundwork for what eventually became the Acton Minor Hockey Association.

"Doc" Harkley, a sobriquet pinned on him by boys who sensed here was a man who really cared, didn't stand on ceremony. Coming here from Winnipeg 10 years ago his station wagon crammed with boys was a familiar sight going to and from hockey tournaments in places as far away as Rochester, N.Y. and as near as the community centre near the community centre.

There was a large section rooting for him in the wings when he entered the hospital and the word was passed "abroad" that the "Doc" was really sick. But all the cheers couldn't make the "large, happy-faced man" well.

Maybe the "Doc" understood boys so well because he and his wife Lorraine had five of their own, Rick, Jeff, Dan, Casey and Kelly all at home. The winter was a busy time for him, ferrying boys to hockey but the summer's were equally hectic.

He was a member of the group known as the committee of seven, in company with Dick Lee, Ed Owen, Pete Vale, G. J. Ockenden, Dick Willie and Don Ryder, which revived minor baseball in Acton for a period.

Garnet Leo Harkley, also called "Nick" by his associates, was an outdoorsman. He dreamed of retiring to his own place some day in the virgin wilderness of northern Alberta or the North West Territories.

His work with construction equipment took him all around the country including a stint in the North West Territories. Confined to an indoor job for several years he wasn't happy until he was working outdoors again. His last employer was Ballantine Construction.

"Doc" became president of the Acton Minor Hockey Association succeeding Ernie Marks and was instrumental along with other sports-minded Actonians in bringing the N.H.L. Old-Timers here. He also acted as Acton representative on the Tri-County hockey executive.

A Legion memorial service was held at the Rummly-Shepherd Funeral home Sunday, Feb. 4 for the R.C.A.F. Veteran. The funeral was held Monday afternoon from the funeral home with Rev. A. McKenney officiating. Burial was in Fairview cemetery.

Pallbearers were Frank Jones, Ed Owen, James Hibbert, John Weldon, Harold Townsley and Jim Higgins.

Mr. Harkley is survived by his wife and family of 142 Churchill Rd. S. and his mother Mrs. Margaret Lewis, of Toronto. His father, Richard Harkley, predeceased him.

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Eramosa council zoning by-law being prepared

ROCKWOOD - A zoning bylaw is being prepared by the Eramosa Township Council for the use and access of land as well as any buildings to be erected on the land in the township.

Provisions in the bylaw, which has been presented to council and has received first reading, include prohibiting the use of land for or except such purposes as may be set out in the bylaw within the township; prohibiting the erection of buildings or structures, except for such purposes as may be set out in the bylaw; regulating the type of construction and the height, bulk,

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
