Well-known sports personality (Doc) Harkley dies

Ill since he suffered a heart seizure last May, one of Action's best-known sports/ personalities died at Guelph General Hospital Saturday, February 3.

Garnet Leo (Doc) Harkley, 48, a familiar and likeable fixture in the minor hockey system in Actor for many years, succumbed to the illness which curtailed the activity he liked best worlding with the kids.

He was a one man gang when it came to organizing sports for boys. Consumed by a desire to get things done, he unabashedly with the help of a few other men, organized and promoted Tri-County hockey here, laying the groundwork for what eventually became the Acton Minor Hockey Association.

"Doc" Harkley, a sobriquet pinhed on him by boys who sensed here was a man who really cared, didn't stand on ceremony, Coming here from Wimipeg 10 years ago his station wagon crammed with boys was a familiar sight going to and from hockey trounsments in places as far away as Rochester, N.Y. and as near as the community cennear as the community centre.

There was a large section rooting for him in the wings when he entered the hospital and the word was noised "abroad" that the "Doc" was really sick, But all the cheers couldn't make the "large, happyfaced man" well.

Maybe the "Doc" understood boys so well because he and his wife Lorraine had five of their own, Rick, Jeff, Dan, Casey and Kelly all at home. The winter was a busy time for him, ferrying boys to hockey but the summer's were equally

Dick Willie and Don Ryder, which revived minor baseball in Acton for a period, Garnet Leo Harkley, also called "Nick" by his associates, was an outdoorsman. He dreamed of retiring to his own place some day in the virgin wilderness of northern Alberta or the

North West Territories. His work with construction equipment took him all around the country including a stint in the North West Territories. Confined to an indoor job for several years he wasn't happy until he was working outdoors again. His last employer was Ballentine Construc-

"Doc" became president of the Acton Minor Hockey Association succeeding Ernie Marks and was instrumental along with other sports-minded Actonians in bringing the N.H.L. Old-Timers here. He also acted as Acton representative on the Tri-County hockey executive.
