In the last purchase of books for the Acton Public Library for the children in later Public School grades are some outstanding in geographic as well as historic visues. Among these are titles such as Mexico, Russia, Thailand, China, Japan, Iran, Equatorial Africa, West Indies, Israel. India, Nigeria, Greece, Egypt and Echlopis, also a set of sports books - 28 or 30 of them. A few of them are Fishing, Fly Fishing, Tennis, Soccer, Hunting, Archery, Boxing - all these and many more fictional and factual for all ages from Grade 1 up. In the adult section, in the art department is "The McMichael Conservation Collection" - by Tom Thomson and the Group of Seven.

"The Ancestral Roof" Marion Macrae and Anthony Adamson - is a lovely book, which portrays and tells about the cultural and social history of the period 1783 - 1867.

"The Search for Amelia Earhart" by Fred Goerner, a mystery of thirty years, has been more or less unravelled by the author after four trips to the Pacific Islands and Interviews with scores of people, natives, ex- G.L's, Generals, Admirals, and Washington officials and all this put together forms the
