Four new T.B. cases found

Christmas seals bring in \$38,000

The sale of Christmas seals, which provides funds for the control of Tuberculosis and other important respiratory diseases, produced record revenues in Ontario this year. An interim report by the Ontario Tuberculosis Association shows contributions exceeding \$1,500,000, almost 10,000 higher than the 1966 Christmas Seal campaign.

Seventeen of the 47 provincial volunteer organizations which are coordinated by the Ontario Tuberculosis Association, achieved more than 100 percent of last year's result, the highest being Grey County district at 11 percent of the 1966 total.

Halton, too, is enjoying a record year. Mrs. M. E. Lunau of the Halton T. B. Association said Halton had contributed \$38,000 which is a little better than last year.

She said 32,333 sets of seals were sent out from the Halton office.

Mrs. Lunau illustrated the need for a strong association by citing a case this month in south Halton where four children between the ages of two and eight, all in the same family, were admitted to the sanatorium with Tuberculosis. In this case the grandmother was the contact.

"This shows we can never let our guard down," said Mrs. Lunau. She reports a second case in North Halton last month where a mother, her brother, two of her children and a playmate of the children were admitted to the sanatorium.

Mrs. Lunau explained the Halton branch will expand their program to include asthma, bronchitis and emphysema.

The campaign closes officially at the end of February and contributions are still being accepted.

New stamps honor Canadian pioneers

Three commemorative postage stamps to honor personages from the pages of Canada's history will be added to the Canada Post Office 1968 program, Postmaster General Jean-Pierre Cote announced today.

The first of the three additions to be released on August 7, will mark the 150th anniversary of the year in which George Brown, a Father of Confederation, was born. It will be followed on September 4 by a stamp honoring Henri Bourassa, a pioneer Canadian nationalist, whose birth occurred 100 years ago.

The third addition will commemorate the 50th anniversary of the death of John McCrae, soldier, physician and poet, whose "In Flanders Fields" became one of the best known poems written by a Canadian. Appropriately, the McCrae stamp will appear on November 6 as a joint issue with a previously announced stamp marking the 50th anniversary of the 1918 Armistice.

Issues commemorating the births of Brown and Bourassa, both of whom were journalists, will have a joint connotation with Canada's linguistic heritage. In addition to being one of Canada's Fathers of Confederation, George Brown founded the English language Toronto Globe; Henri Bourassa was founder of the Montreal French language Le Doyeur.

Mr. Cote listed the revised stamp schedule as follows:

Gray Jay, February 15; 200th Anniversary of 1st Motorological Readings, March 13; Narwhal, April 10; International Hydrological Decade, May 8; 300th Anniversary, Voyage of the Nonsuch, June 5; Lacrosse, July 3; 150th Anniversary, Birth of George Brown, August 7; 100th Anniversary, Birth of Henri Bourassa, September 4; Christmas (two denominations), October 9; 50th Anniversary, 1918 Armistice, November 6; 50th Anniversary, Death of John McCrae, November 6.

Convertible burns in freak accident

A Guelph man's car was completely destroyed in a freak fire on the Guelph Line just south of Brookville Tuesday afternoon of last week.

Milton Fire Brigade was called but could do nothing to halt the flames. They said they saw the Guelph man driving along when he noticed a flat tire. He stopped and jacked the car up to change the tire, but the jack slipped and poked a hole in the gas tank. The escaping gas caught fire and the car was enveloped in flames.

Snowy owls reported in southern Ontario

A number of large, white owls have been reported from various localities in southern Ontario during the past few weeks. Every few years the Snowy Owl leaves its arctic home and invades southern Canada and the northern United States. This usually happens one year in four.

In the arctic, the Snowy Owl depends for food on lemmings and other rodents, and to some extent on birds and fishes. Lemmings tend to fluctuate violently in numbers periodically, building up to great abundance every four years or so, then suddenly dying off. In the resulting periods of lemming scarcity the owls are forced southward to find food.

The Snowy is a large white owl, often barred and spotted with dark brown. It is active in daylight and frequents open places. They are often seen perched on TV antennas and lead trees - along the lakeshore. Snowies sit on breakwaters or ice piled on the shore.

During the Bird Counts taken around Christmas time a total of 59 Snowy Owls were reported in Ontario. Kingston reported 18, most of them on Wolfe Island - 10 were seen in Ottawa, 6 in Barrie, and 5 near Blenheim. For some reason Kingston usually has the best count of Snowy Owls of all the 700 counts taken over North America.

The Snowy Owl is protected under the laws of Ontario, and it is illegal to kill them by any means. This comes under the jurisdiction of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests.

The popular "Ookpik" was inspired by the Snowy Owl. This Eskimo design has been widely distributed throughout the world and is probably as well-known a symbol of Canada as is the maple leaf.

Snowy Owls nest on the arctic tundra. The nest is on the ground, often just a depression lined with moss or grass in a high spot on rolling tundra.
