Producers review 1967 hog marketing

The Halton Hog Producers met at the Agricultural Office, Milton, on Thursday, February 15, for their annual meeting, under the chairmanship of Tom Broughton. It was reported that only four farmers had taken advantage of the \$10 bonus provided by the Halton Hog Producars to farmers purchasing, approved boars. A special contribution of \$75 was. given to Oxfam of Canada during the past year, to enable a farm. in Central Swaziland, in Africa. to join their Producets' Co-Operative, and enable him to purchase some seed and fertilizer, and solfiprove his standard

Ben Steers, president of the Ontario Hog Producers Assoclation; discussed the changes in hog-marketings thiring the past year. He stated that 1,000,000 extra hogs were marketed, with

farmers receiving \$1,000,000 fewer dollars than in the previous year. This amounted to a 19 per, cent increase in production. Exports were 60,000, 000 pounds, with 85 per cent of this going to the United States. Imports of 24,000,000 pounds of pork were slightly above the previous year. Mr. Steers stated there is some demand for quotas on log production in Ontario, but that this mirst be considered for all of Canada if it were to be effective. Considerable discussion is taking place in cooperation with the Meat Packers' Council of Canada on a new grading system for hogs; taking into-'consideration' the cut-out value, or the amount of lean meat in a carcass:

Richards, Dean of the Ontario 'Agricultural College, University of Guelph.
