## Sheep dog takes Bermuda title

CALEDON - Tarwood's Beau Billy D., an Old-English Sheep dog has travelled from his home in Caledon to dog shows in United States and Bermuda. Mrs. Buckland, the dog's owner of R.R. 1, Caledon, reports he was entered at the Westminster Kennel Club competitions in Madison Square Gardens recently. He is scheduled to appear in shows at New Haven, Conn., and Providence, R.I. He is the Canadian-American-Bermuda Champion and is the only Old-English Sheep dog in the world to hold a championship from Bermuda.

## Low rentals Fergus Subject

FERGUS - Low-rental housing - a subject which is taking precedence in many other communities - was introduced at a recent Fergus council meeting. Fergus council and representatives of the Ontario Housing Association met to determine whether there is a need for row houses or apartments which rent from \$32 a month on family incomes of \$204 per month. The price includes charges for heat, water, hot water, stove and refrigerator.

Fergus juvenile hockey team will play a team from Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y. in an exhibition game. Most of the Cornell team of Junior B calibre, is from Canada. Hockey is popular in Ithaca and there's a possibility some of the Fergus players will be scouted for athletic scholarships to Cornell.

## Vote for strike, if necessary

MILTON - Negotiations underway since January 15 between the union and Ontario Steel Products, have so far produced no settlement, a Local 1067 U.A.W. spokesman said last week. The union reported they are after the same package as auto workers have been getting. Voters in the Milton, Chatham and Oshawa plants of Ontario Steel have authorized a strike if it is necessary. The Milton plant voted 96.6 per cent for strike action. The union said it was trying to get in a legal position to strike or have a settlement by March 15.

Milton high school will introduce "cautiously in an experimental way" an upgraded approach next fall, school principal R. C. Hunter told the high school board. Block time tables will be introduced providing one period per day for each subject equalizing the time available. Some subjects now receive more time than others.

## Stake uranium claims

GEORGETOWN - Five Georgetown men, Gene Logan, Don Schenk, Art Scott, Doug Weir and Bob Healin were hit by uranium fever when the government announcement of open staking was made. The local adventurers with camping equipment, a truck, cars and four ski-dooes staked adjacent claims in the Elliot Lake area. Then they raced to register their claims. There was stiff competition to register since some mining companies used helicopters and planes.

Mrs. Ellis showed how to pack a suit case.

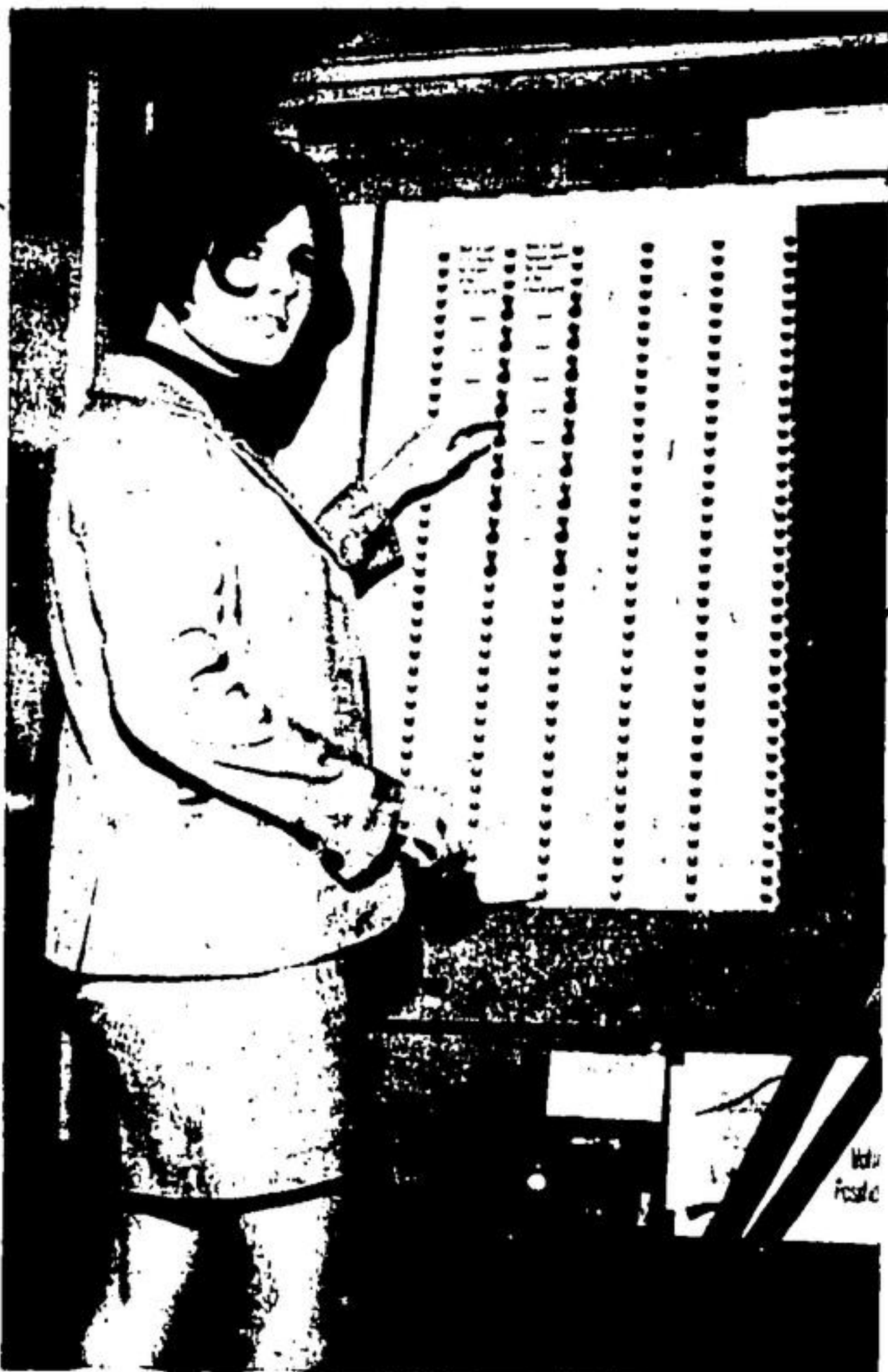
In group work the girls practised writing a "thank-you" note. Chocolate milk and cake was enjoyed at the close of the meeting.

## Ship 58 Holsteins to French breeders

A plane load of 58 purebred Holstein cattle has just been shipped to France. Included were nine bulls and 49 females.

Six of the bulls were shipped by Rockwood International, Georgetown.

The females, consisting of nine cows, 19 bred heifers and 21 open heifers, were consigned to nine different breeders, none of whom will receive more than six head. These cattle will be tested on French farms, under the same conditions as the average dairy cattle in the herds, and will give French dairymen an opportunity to see how the Canadian Holsteins compare with their own. Only a limited number of Canadian Holsteins had previously been shipped to France, and these were largely cared for under optimum conditions.
