Their son, an engineer and an ordained United Church minister, has been in India, drilling wells, and showing the natives how pure water may be obtained.

Mrs. Eaton was born in China where her parents were missionaries; she later became a school teacher. She and her husband went to India on their own and she was able to teach their grandchildren.

Both related many incidents reminding all how grateful we should be for having so much, while so many are starving and in great need.

Close to \$100 was received, to be sent to the needy, as a gift of compassion.

Mr. Wm. Stewart, chairman of the Board extended sincere thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Eaton for their most interesting talk.

O.P.P. report

After two months of almost hectic activity, the members of the Acton O.P.P. have finally been treated to a week of calm. Only seven complaints were lodged at the police office during the week of February 25 to March 2. Of these, three were thefts with goods valued at \$22 being stolen, one was a disturbance at a local hotel resulting in a man being charged under the Criminal Code; one was a liquor violation, also resulting in a charge being laid, and the other two were of a minor nature, settled without necessitating court action.

During the 236 hours worked by the six men detachment and the 688 miles patrolled, traffic activities encountered were also minimal. One motor vehicle ac-

cident, of a minor nature, was investigated, four persons were charged with offences contrary to the Highway Traffic Act and eight others were warned to correct their driving habits.

In Magistrate's Court on February 26, 11 persons saw convictions registered against them on information sworn to by Acton Constables. The 11 guilty parties

paid fines and costs totalling \$200.

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Esquising council

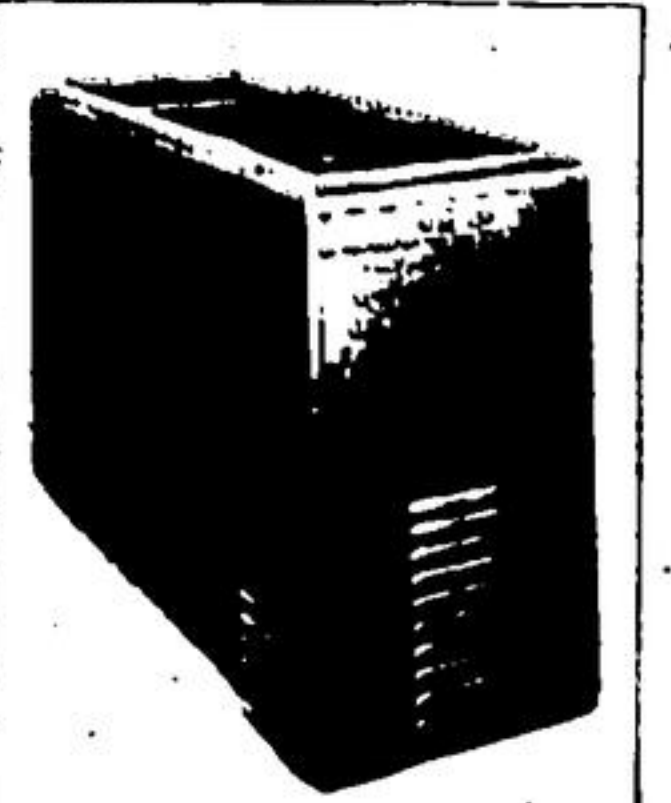
At their regular meeting in the township offices Monday night Esquising council:

- * Withdrew any criticism they might have made of the architect's work on the township offices by a personal apology to Mr. Halford. Evidence indicated to council's satisfaction the architect was not responsible for shortcomings in the building's construction.

- * Discussed the possibility of setting up a finance committee to deal with situations where extra funds were available to the township from time to time.

- * Agreed to same procedures - a public meeting - should be called for Norval as was done in Stewarttown to discuss installation of street lights.

- * Agreed to participate with Nassagaweya township to pave a road on the first three lots on the town line. Estimated cost to Esquising with gates for the railway would be around \$3,000.



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
