Statistics compiled at the local police office show that Liquor, Criminal and traffic occurrences were investigated by the six man force during the 240 hours they worked. As a result of the complaints lodged and the investigation into them, three persons were charged under the Criminal Code, one under the Liquor Control Act and six others with offences against the Highway Traffic Act.

Our accident index showed a slight decrease as only one accident was reported this week. No one was injured in the collision, but \$900 damage was done to the two vehicles involved. One of the drivers was charged with careless driving.

The other traffic activities ex-

perienced during the 729 miles patrolled in the town caused 35 drivers to be warned about lesser traffic offences while eight vehicles were safely checked.
