Placard parade protests transfer

·FERGUS - For more than a century, a rivalry has existed between Fergus and Elora and it flared up, once more. This time it was a protest by students at the Etora Branch of the Centre' Wellington District High School. They were objecting to the proposed transfer of nearly 100 grade 13 and business and commerce students to the Fergus school.

After their demonstration, the parents held a meeting on Sunday night in the Carnegie Hall and picked a delegation to attend the regular school board meeting in Fergus to fight against the loss of the grade 13 classes.

The protest started on Friday morning with a brief sitdown in the school foyer. At noon, there was a placard-carrying parade along the Elora main street with those taking part chanting support.

This lasted long enough that some students missed the first afternoon class. On their return to the school they were addressed briefly by the school principal, William Ellison, and then returned to their classes.

The march was staged because there are fears expressed in Elora that this could be the first step in the Elora school becoming just a satellite of the much larger high school in Fergus.

After the merger of the two boards two years ago, plans were made for a new technical wing at the Fergus school and Elora residents knew then that some students would be coming to Fergus but the board's decision to put all grade 13 students as well in the Fergus school came as a surprise and sparked last week's events.

Another dam site close by ...

MILTON - The \$557,000 Hilton Falls dam and reservoir -second of three major dams being built by Hulton Region Conservation Area within a five-mile radius of Milton -- should soon be underway.

Clearing operations at the site began last week and the Authority is awaiting only the final approval from the Department of Energy and Resources Management in Toronto, before calling tenders. The construction of the earthon dam itself is estimated at \$487,000. with land costs and engineering fees to bring the total over the \$550,000 mark.

Site of the dam is at the Fifth Line road allowance north of Campbellville (No. 5) Sideroad in Nassagaweya Township. The dam will stretch 800 feet long across a natural u-shaped rocklined valley 2,000 feet long and 700 feet wide. It will trap 1,200 acre feet of water in a lake up to 35 feet deep.

Water will be released from the dam through a concrete channel. While it will be known as the Hilton Falls dam, it will not spoil Halton's last remaining natural waterfall by the same name. The waterfall, once the site of several thriving lumber mills, lies a mile north-west of the dam site on another branch of the Sixteen Mile Creek. The first lumbor mill there was built by Edward Hilton in 1835 and it was a busy industry until at least 1863.

Plan Miller golf tourney Georgetown

GEORGETOWN - Georgetown Golf and Country Club will be the scene of the 1968 Carling Miller Golf Championship. The Miller is now part of the Canadian pro golf tour worth a total of \$100,000. Ten thousand dollars in prize money will be at stake which has been won in recent years by such great Canadian golfers as George Knudson, Wilf Homenuik, Al Johnson and Frank Wibbly. Because it is now part of the Canadian tour and also because of the large amount of prize money almost all of the finest golfers in Canada will likely compete in the Miller this year. It's expected there'll be TV coverage of the event. Another feature, on the day prior to the Miller a large Pro-Am tourney will see approximately 150 golf pros and the same number of amateurs trying for \$4,000 in prize money on the same course.

Georgetown's capital debt is a matter of serious concern for the mayor and council of our neighboring town. The present capital debt of \$2,800,000 will rise to almost \$6,000,000 by the end of the year which will mean a debt of 25 per cent of the assessment, a danger point according to the Ontario Municipal Board. Despite one of the lowest mill rates in the county, 1967 will show a slight surplus. Deputy-reeve Art Speight said the mill rate should have been raised some years ago so there would be a contingency fund to look after essential things which must be done.
